

Copyright Laws & Peer-to-Peer File Sharing

Capri College will not tolerate any infringement of copyright laws or illegal downloading; including peer-to-peer file sharing. Copyright infringement is the act of exercising, without permission or legal authority, one or more of the exclusive rights granted to the copyright owner under section 106 of the Copyright Act (Title 17 of the United States Code). These rights include the right to reproduce or distribute a copyrighted work. In the file-sharing context, downloading or uploading substantial parts of a copyrighted work without authority constitutes an infringement.

Penalties for copyright infringement laws include civil and criminal penalties. Civil penalties can include actual damages or "statutory" damages affixed at not less than \$750 and not more than \$30,000 per work infringed. "Willful" infringement, a court may award up to \$150,000 per work infringed and can also assess court costs and attorneys' fees. Criminal penalties include imprisonment of up to five years and fines up to \$250,000 per offense.

Students will be subject to standard Capri College disciplinary measures, as well as, any local, state or federal punishment.
